Waterbugs tell us a story

Many aquatic ecologists use waterbugs to tell them how polluted the water is in the streams that the waterbugs live in. What are waterbugs? The official term is macroinvertebrates. Macro meaning 'large', and invertebrate meaning 'has no backbone' or in other words, insects, insect larvae, spiders, mites, worms, yabbies and prawns.

On Sunday 25th August, experienced aquatic ecologist Cecil Ellis came from Sydney to train an enthusiastic group of volunteers from SLNC, neighbouring environmental groups and Scouts and Girl Guide leaders in waterbug sampling and identification. The main aim of the Waterbug Blitz program is to train people to become citizen scientists to capture data about the water quality of creeks and rivers across Australia. The workshop was made possible through funding from Ipswich City Council.

Each of the different waterbug species can tolerate living in water of different quality. Some species can only live in water that is near pristine, whilst others can survive in water that is of poor quality. The data provided the group with an insight into the total biodiversity of what is living in the water. The abundance of waterbugs, total waterbug diversity, and type (taxa) of animals are combined to give a SIGNAL score (from 0 to 10) for the waterway. SIGNAL stands for 'Stream Invertebrate Grade Number – Average Level'. If one finds a wide variety of taxa and species including those that can only tolerate clean water, then the habitat will get a high score, 8-10. However, if only a few species are found or only those species that can tolerate living in poor water quality, then the score will much lower, 1-3.

After collecting our samples, in this case from a reach of Opossum Creek above Discovery Lake, we sat down to identify what we had. Whenever we saw something moving, we caught it and put it in our sample tray for closer identification. We were assisted in this through the use of the Waterbug App on our smart phones. The app took us through a series

of taxonomy questions based on physical characteristics that allowed us to identify the taxa of the organism down to Order, and sometimes Family level (but not species). The data was entered into our smart phones, summarised into a SIGNAL score and then sent off (including photos) to the national database.

When the sampling site was first scouted there was flowing water. However, by the time of the training we were lucky that there was still some water left in the creek. The expert said that in this semi-urbanised environment, and without flowing water, the water quality would be poor—especially with regard to the dissolved oxygen that all aquatic organisms need to breathe.

Nevertheless, we found 22 different taxa, including caddis fly larvae, dragonfly larvae, damselfly larvae, mites, a blood worm, freshwater prawns and two types of yabbies. However, the SIGNAL score came out as 3.4, which is regarded as poor, although the expert said that it was better than he expected.

His parting words were – after it rains, we should go out again and practice our new skills. We're still waiting for some decent rain to get the creek flowing again!

In the most recent sitting of Parliament, I had the opportunity to meet with Consumer Action Law Centre CEO Gerard Brody, the Salvation Army and members of the 'Stop The Debt Trap' alliance.

This group are a coalition of over 20 consumer advocacy organisations from around Australia including financial experts, community advocates and service providers who have banded together to support my campaign to end the payday lending rip off by implementing stronger laws to protect Australians from irresponsible lenders.

Included in their delegation was payday lending victim Noorlia, who escaped family violence and was close to being homeless, only to be exploited by the out-of-control payday lending industry and fall into the debt trap, as thousands of people do.

I've spoken at length in the Parliament on more than 20 occasions on the desperate need to clamp down on the out-of-control payday loan industry and the loan sharks who are ripping off more than 800,000 Australian households.

But, despite promise after promise by multiple government ministers, including in writing to me by former Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull, there appears to be no forthcoming action. This is a huge issue not only for our community but right across Australia with thousands of people every day forced into payday loans just to get by.

With the cost of living rising, we must ensure that vulnerable people in our community receive the support they need, rather than turning to the loan sharks. I'll continue to stand up and fight to see the proper protections implemented.

While enjoying all the tour had to offer by way of games, opportunities to meet some big names, see notable sights and train with world renowned coaches, members of the group and their families had time to learn about the history of the areas they visited and were lucky enough to walk in the footsteps of The Beatles.

"We could not have prepared ourselves for just how much we were able to experience, and the opportunities that were given to every child - with a couple of the 12/13 year old boys invited back next year to trial by a couple of the Academies themselves. Bryn has also been invited back to tour with Euro Football Star and ProSoccerGlobal again next year, which we are all so excited about."

It also helps to get our name out and about and it helps fund our shed through the donation the shed receives from the customer.

Kerbside Collection on next month



Kerbside Collection is once again happening in greater Springfield and surrounds to help local residents get rid of unwanted household items not suitable for general waste or recycle bins.

Augustine Heights, Brookwater, Springfield and Springfield Central will be serviced from 2-6 December with Springfield Lakes serviced from 9-13 December.

Take note of the following do's and don'ts to ensure the area is kept tidy and does not obstruct traffic or pedestrians in the lead up to the collections.

Items Accepted

- Furniture
- Household appliances and white goods (excluding appliances containing refrigerant such as fridges, freezers and air conditioners).
- Carpet and lino
- Bath and laundry tubs
- Wood products
- Bicycles
- Outdoor play equipment (must be dismantled)

Items Not Accepted

- Explosives and ammunition
- Hot ash or material that is smouldering or aflame
- Appliances containing refrigerant such as fridges, freezers and air conditioners
- Lengths of timber longer than one meter
- Vegetation (green waste)
- Dirt and stones
- Bricks and concrete
- Commercial builders waste
- Car/truck/machinery parts, batteries and tyres
- General household waste (food scraps)
- Paint and paint tins
- Fuel tins
- Hazardous waste including: clinical, chemicals, oils, asbestos and liquids
- Gas bottles
- Glass and mirrors (whole and broken)

Collection Guidelines

- Items must not exceed two cubic metres in volume
- Items can be easily and safely lifted by two people
- No sharp or dangerous objects are placed on kerbside
- Piles are tidy on the footpath and roadway is kept clear
- Doors are removed from cupboards
- Outdoor play equipment is to be dismantled

THE Art Studio

with Jolanta



Yet another weed. Nature and natural inspirations so often influence both contemporary and classical art that it might sound almost cliché. Whether we want this or not, we are part of a larger eco system. Our world is defined by the air we breathe in, the quality of water we drink, whether we see the Milky Way above our heads at night or flood lights of the nearest shopping centre. What we eat and what we dispose, what nurtures us and what pushes our boundaries, whether we are surrounded by sounds of nature or sounds of the city's heartbeat—this is our habitat and the place we call home.

While wondering around the old towns and centuries old city squares, hidden gems of European street networks, hallways, underground networks of connections and passages, I have come across an interesting exhibition inspired by every gardener's nightmare—Weeds Atlas by Wojciech Ireneusz Sobczyk.

The word 'weeds' might make most gardeners irritated, yet this exhibition explores the hostility felt towards a broad concept of undesired 'weed' habitat, whether it is social concept or something else, relevant to the viewer experiencing the collection.



The artist was inspired by inner-city buildings, home to many. At the same time these plants have origins in their home habitat and are part of a larger eco system somewhere else.

The *Weeds Atlas* collection commences a dialogue about human relations with their environment, sometimes the desired one, but often undesired one...rooted in its local area and neighbourhood demonstrating a kind of belonging.

The artist is taking a close look at the world of weeds—a world of hidden meanings, interconnections and symbiosis between different organisms, much like lab conditions – clear, sterile, perhaps unrealistic or overcontrolled.

In this context, the collection poses a question about our own role in this eco system...who are we as a community and as individuals?

Breathtaking composition and complex forms could take attention from the fundamental question – who are the 'weeds' here, are these really only plants?

Toad catching season has begun!



Last month, members of the Springfield Lakes Nature Care group held their first toad catching night for the season with 158 toads caught in that one night by volunteers roaming around Spring Lake and surrounding streets with light, buckets and gloves.

"We have been organising public cane toad catching nights for the last two summers around the lake and last season noticed a significant increase in the number of native frogs and insects seen and heard compared to the prior season," said Luise Manning, Springfield Lakes Nature Care founder.

"We hold the events on the first Friday of each month at Spring Lake pontoon (near Ash Barty tennis courts) from October to April, starting at 7pm.

"At the event we train new participants in how to differentiate between a cane toad and a native frog so that they can operate independently, catching toads near where they live so that native frogs and other animals (including pets) can live more safely. Our next cane toad catching night is on Friday 6th December. Hope to see you there!"
